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WELCOME

Let us “listen to what the Spirit is saying.” (Rev 2:7). What a wonderful invitation we have received from the Bishops of Australia! This scripture passage, sitting as it does, underneath the logo of Plenary Council 2020, is at the heart of our engagement during this period of listening and dialogue for the Church in Australia.

We accompany Jesus on this plenary journey, and are invited into Gospel encounters. Who do we meet at the heart of the Gospel? Our family, friends, neighbours and work colleagues. The Gospel people are today’s people, experiencing the same hopes and joys, griefs and sorrows as those from centuries earlier. We are invited in these plenary days to sit with a drink in the midday Australian sun, conversing with a woman from outside the religious tradition, and outside her own social circle (John 4). We listen attentively to two travellers, downcast on their way home on a dusty outback track after witnessing everything they believed about their faith being torn away (Luke 24:13-35). We experience the elation of those coming back from mission to the growth areas of our urban centres, fresh with stories of new life (Luke 10:17). We share in the grief of friends heartbroken at the loss of their beloved friend or family member (John 11).

In this time of privileged encounter, our bishops ask us to honour the stories we hear, by sharing the wisdom gleaned and questions raised. We are invited to raise our voices, to become a cloud of witnesses, sharing in the question of “What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?” There can be no more important question? And we are a pilgrim people. We recognise that we need one another, and by listening to the truth of one another, we step more deeply into the Divine Truth, connected as we are in the One Spirit. By listening to one another, we open our eyes and ears to what the Spirit is saying in our midst.

This resource is offered to be of practical assistance to those who wish to bring to life the heart of Plenary 2020 with their own communities. It is offered as an accompaniment to the good work already happening within your own community and alongside the rich material available via the national plenary website.

Thank you for your willingness to take on this special role of encouraging others to walk the plenary journey.

Your voice matters. Every voice matters.

Let us speak boldly and with passion, and listen with open and humble hearts.

2 TIPS FOR GETTING STARTED WITH PLENARY 2020

2.1 PRAY FOR GUIDANCE TO LISTEN TO WHAT THE SPIRIT IS SAYING

- Make prayer with God the foundation for your role
- Discover the heart of Plenary
 - » To listen to the Holy Spirit through offering a safe and vibrant environment for people to listen and dialogue with one another.
 - » To be true to our mission to love God and love our neighbour as our self.
 - » To hold firm to what is at the heart of our Catholic faith as we engage with the changing world, to grow and share our faith in Jesus Christ in a relevant, life-giving way.
- To be clear about what this is not:
 - » Not to change the agenda of the church. Our plan remains sharing the Good news of Jesus Christ in and through our Catholic Church
 - » Not a lobbying exercise to push our own personal agendas regardless of where the Holy Spirit may be calling our Church
 - » Not a brainstorming activity to generate vast pools of dot points without any clear purpose.
 - » Not a scramble to change everything and wipe away all that we hold dear
 - » Not a cynical exercise where nothing will change

2.2 ENGAGE LEADERSHIP AND OTHER KEY MEMBERS

- In parishes, make sure the parish priest, school principal or other key leader is strongly committed.
- Involve appropriate leadership and advisory teams such as the Parish Pastoral Council or equivalent body and any key staff/team members.
- Deanery Pastoral Council members are asked to be key representatives in parishes.

2.3 FORM A TEAM

- The stronger the team, the stronger your engagement. See 4.3 Forming a Team for more details. Whoever steps in, take time to immerse in Plenary 2020 and hold your own session.
- The team has four main tasks. If sufficient members, divide roles into these areas
 1. Pray: Engage the community in prayer for hearts and minds aligned to the Holy Spirit, open to the signs of the times, and for the building up of our church.
 2. Inform: Ensure everyone knows Plenary is happening!
 3. Offer Small Group Sessions and other ways of Listening and Dialogue
 4. Outreach beyond your Gathered Community/Group

3 PLENARY COUNCIL 2020 A SHORT OVERVIEW

3.1 WHAT IS PLENARY 2020?

- Plenary 2020 is the name given to a process initiated by the Australian bishops who are inviting people to engage in listening, dialogue and discernment about the future of the Church in Australia around the Plenary Council meetings in 2020 and 2021.
- A Plenary Council is the highest form of gathering that a church in a particular country can have. It is an opportunity for the voices of all the People of God in Australia, laity and ordained alike, to be heard. The last major assembly for the Catholic Church of Australia took place more than eighty years ago in 1937.
- A Plenary Council has legislative power, i.e. the final decisions of a plenary council become law and have binding power. The responsibility of making these decisions falls on the conference of bishops, who do so only after discerning the will of the Holy Spirit with the people.

3.2 WHY ARE THE BISHOPS HOLDING A PLENARY COUNCIL?

- The contemporary society of Australia has changed significantly, and just as Pope John XXIII called the universal Church to “Throw open the windows of the church and let the fresh air of the spirit blow through” at Vatican II, it is time for the Church in Australia to evaluate how we are responding to society and to let the Holy Spirit guide us in our way forward.
- As our own Bishop Vincent Long said “..., we must become a humble, listening and discerning church. The Plenary Council... will be an opportunity for us to listen humbly and with open hearts to one another and especially to what the Spirit is saying to us at this time.”
- The Royal Commission into Institutional Response to Child Sexual Abuse has also been a significant and influential event that requires deep consideration and response.

3.3 WHAT IS THE PLENARY 2020 TIMELINE?

- The national dialogue started in May 2018 around the question:
What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?
- The four main stages of Plenary 2020 are:
 - » Listening Sessions: Now till 6 March 2019
 - » Discerning, Developing & Testing Themes: May 2019 to Dec 2019
 - » Drafting Council Program and Documents. Meetings Held (2020 & 2021)
 - » Implementation: 2021 and beyond



4 HOW OUR DIOCESE IS ENGAGING IN PLENARY 2020

4.1 SUPPORTING PLENARY AND SUPPORTING OUR LOCAL COMMUNITIES AND DIOCESE

- The Diocese of Parramatta is actively involved in Plenary 2020 and Bishop Vincent Long, our Bishop is encouraging everyone, Catholics and non-Catholics alike, to give feedback to the Plenary.
- Some, if not all, of the final outcomes of the second Plenary Council Meeting in 2021 will need to be ratified from the Holy See before they have the force of law.
- There are some things we can do as a Diocese much earlier. To help us plan and implement pastoral initiatives from 2019 onwards, Bishop Vincent is asking the people of the Diocese of Parramatta to also give feedback to the Diocese.

5 FORMING A TEAM

5.1 WHO ARE THE TEAM MEMBERS?

- **Parish:** Each parish will ideally have two deanery pastoral council representatives. Members may include:
 - » Deanery Pastoral Council Members;
 - » A Parish Team member;
 - » A couple of Pastoral Council members;
 - » Key networkers and animators in your community.

Consider inviting an existing team such as Stewardship, Planning or Renewal to take this on.

- **Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta** will coordinate the process in schools, who are also invited to connect back to their Deanery Pastoral Council.
- **Other Agencies** and Groups are invited to develop their own teams

5.2 TEAM RESPONSIBILITIES

- **Coordinator(s) Role:** The deanery pastoral council representatives or other community/ agency coordinators have some key roles:
 - » Engaging with community leadership
 - This may include regular updates to community leaders and representative groups
 - Flagging potential challenges and opportunities
 - » Animating the team
 - Share a time of prayer and meal when you begin
 - Get to know each other
 - Be very clear on plenary
 - Engage in your own plenary session
 - » Keeping connected with the pastoral planning office and national plenary for updates
 - Keep updated on what is happening
 - Share updates about what you are doing – this will be helpful for others
 - Ask for help early and often
 - » Keeping connected with the pastoral planning office and national plenary for updates
 - Consider the tasks below and prepare a brief action plan detailing who will do what and when and how.
- **The team has four main tasks.** If sufficient members, divide roles into these areas
 - » Engaging with community leadership
 - Engage the Community in Prayer
 - Inform
 - Offer Small Groups and other Plenary Sessions
 - Outreach

6 ENGAGE THE COMMUNITY IN PRAYER

4.1 SUPPORTING PLENARY AND SUPPORTING OUR LOCAL COMMUNITIES AND DIOCESE

- Engage the community in prayer for hearts and minds aligned to the Holy Spirit, open to the signs of the times, and for the building up of our church.
- Include a prayer for Plenary 2020 in the Prayer of the Faithful.
- Pray the Plenary prayer at meetings and/or Mass.
- Prayer groups in community to hold up Plenary 2020 as an intention.
- Distribute the plenary prayer cards.
- Ask local prayer groups to share in the plenary intentions
- More prayer resources are available through both the diocesan and national plenary website

7 INFORM THE COMMUNITY

ENSURE EVERYONE KNOWS PLENARY IS HAPPENING!

IMPORTANTLY, ENCOURAGE THEM TO MOVE FROM BEING A PLENARY CONSUMER TO A PLENARY PROMOTER

- Subscribe to National Plenary website
- Attend a training session conducted by the Pastoral Planning Office, then offer your own for the community.
- Bulletin notices and homily points (over a series of weeks). See the diocesan or national website for example
- Use your Website and other communication channels.
- Inform the various ministries and groups (using letter and info sheet).
- Place the pull up banner in a prominent space; place little cards and tri-fold flyers close by.
- Distribute diocesan tri-fold flyers and encourage people to share with others. At Masses, place these in pews and hand out after Mass.
- Put up posters and outdoor banner.
- Play the plenary videos.
- Host an information session.

8 OFFER PLENARY SESSIONS

USING SMALL GROUP BOOKLETS:

1. Identify key reps in community – ministry group leaders/members and others who have a spirit of hospitality and friendliness. Open same process to school parents.
2. Explain the role of the small group booklets in a session.
3. Each of these people to find two to three others – family, friends (little cards may help invite).
4. Have a sign-up Sunday where others can join group.
5. Groups don't all have to start at same time or go for same length.
6. Ensure the group leaders are supported.
7. If your parish is considering renewal or feedback, incorporate session 5 and ask Pastoral Planning Office for support.
8. Insert little sheet for Session 5 with your own Pathways.
9. Encourage people to bring journals and pens to sessions.

9 OUTREACH (STARTING IDEAS)

PLENARY IS NOT FOR THOSE JUST IN OUR COMMUNITY OR ORGANISATION, IT IS FOR EVERYONE.

How do we move out of our own circle and engage others in the plenary invitation?

Firstly, we must move from being plenary consumers to plenary promoters.

Who is in our own circle of family members, friends, colleagues and other networks that we can engage in the spirit of plenary? The little cards may be particularly useful to start a conversation.

HERE ARE SOME INITIATIVES YOU MAY TRY OR ADAPT

1. "Share a Cuppa & Your Thoughts" Session

- a. Slogan: We are Catholic. We are Listening. Share your advice on how we can work with our local community better.
- b. Flyers: Share with family, friends, colleagues
- c. Facebook link: Share with family, friends, colleagues
At the event, ensure there is hospitality, break into small groups, have trained facilitators, and include a short introduction and video about the Plenary. Record feedback on butcher paper, or on laptop (and project so that all can see). Finish the evening with a thank you and possible follow up activities.
- d. The Pastoral Planning Office is able to provide support if required.

2. Town Hall/Library Forum

- a. Approach your local council and ask for a listening forum along the lines above.
- b. You may also consider library or other neutral location for a meeting.

3. Interfaith and/or ecumenical forum

Gather with other local faith communities and invite their feedback

4. Promote to non-worshipping Catholics

Sample ad for newspaper or school bulletin: *Catholic? Don't Come to Sunday Worship? We want to hear from you*

5. Parent Forums via schools

SRE catechists to include information in letter to students' parents (Ensure you have permission from the school principal or delegate before you do this)

6. Visit Aged Care Homes and Speak to Catholics who no longer attend Mass due to illness, etc.

7. Hold Forum to Workshop with Parishioners ways they can hold a session at home with family, or in their social circle

8. Piggy Back Existing Parish Events

- a. Sacramental preparation parents of younger children
- b. RCIA participants
- c. Baptism Parents
- d. Marriage Preparation Couples

9. Consider Newspaper Ad, Bulletin Board at Shopping Centre/Library, Online bulletin boards, online Facebook group for local area, banner outside church, letter box drops; radio

10 ENGAGEMENT STRATEGIES IN MORE DETAIL

10.1 SMALL GROUP GATHERINGS

- Our Diocese has developed the Plenary 2020 Small Group Booklet, a resource for individuals and small groups in parishes, schools, and other settings to engage with Plenary 2020. Download a copy of this resource from parracatholic.org/haveyoursay
- These small group Listening and Dialogue Encounters are one of discernment and prayer, where participants gather to listen, share and contemplate the will of God.
- The 3–5 session process (each session taking approximately 60 to 90 minutes) invites participants to:
 - » Reflect on the plenary question individually; share their responses with group; decide on topic; offer their experience and stories around this topic.
 - » Pray, talk and listen to each other
 - » Submit responses online via plenarycouncil.catholic.org.au
- A new topic is discussed each time the group meets.
- Individuals and groups can make submissions from now to 6 March 2019.
- In an optional final session, participants are invited to engage with anything they want to offer for parish/diocese etc. See section 8.3.2 on how to submit your responses to the Diocese

10.2 PARISH-WIDE GATHERING

- Parishes might like to gather as a whole, in addition to, or in place of, the small group sessions.
- The process described in the Small Group booklet can be adapted for use in the larger parish group, but it must be kept in mind that the process is one of trying to discern the will of God, which involves contemplation and pray, and should therefore not be rushed.
- After the Gathering
 - » Parish response to Plenary 2020 submitted on the Plenary 2020 portal
 - » Parish response to Diocese submitted to Diocesan Pastoral Planning Office (if using Session 5)
- See the Organising a Parish Gathering Section of this resource for suggestions on how to do this

10.3 DEANERY FORUMS

- The Deanery Forums aim to bring together representatives from all the local gatherings in parishes and schools etc, to offer “gathered church” response.
- Two Deanery forums will be held in each of the five deaneries.
- Attendees will include
 - » Parishes
 - » Schools
 - » ethnic groups
 - » other community groups within the diocese
- Other attendees will include
 - » Dean and clergy from each parish in the deanery
 - » Members from the Plenary 2020 Diocesan Team
 - » Representative from the Curia

11 RESOURCES AVAILABLE

11.1 PLENARY SUPPORT KIT: (THIS RESOURCE)

A simple, practical kit for local representatives. This resource includes information on the process used by the Diocese of Parramatta and suggestions on how to organise small group and parish gatherings; information on the various resources that are available and suggestions on how to use them, as well as strategies to engage with those with minimal connection to the church.

11.2 PLENARY 2020 INFORMATION SHEETS

Plenary 2020 Information Sheets can be used at Parish Pastoral Council and other parish group meetings to raise awareness of Plenary 2020, and to encourage participation.

11.3 BROCHURE

Simple tri-fold brochure which provides information on how to engage with Plenary 2020. Encourage parishioners/community members to take these flyers and pass them to family, friends and workmates.

There is space at the back of the flyer for the local representative/ coordinator to leave their contact details. It is best to have an idea if your parish, school or community group will be /are open to hosting small group sessions. If not, try to find out if parishes or other community groups will be doing so, so that you can direct enquiries to them.

11.4 SMALL GROUP BOOKLET

This "Lenten Programme" style resource is best used by groups of 3 to 8 people who make a commitment to meet a number of times over several weeks. The process used in this resource also encourages participants to continue the spirit of engagement beyond plenary process.

Starting at a place of prayer and discernment, the resource can also be used by individuals and its contents adapted for use in larger settings.

11.5 LET'S CHAT CARDS

Starting a conversation about the Church may not always be easy, and these palm-sized cards can be used as to provide a sedge way.

11.6 PROMOTIONAL RESOURCES

3 types of posters/banners are currently available:

- A2 sized posters which can be put up on notice boards in the church, school or other public places.
- An indoor pull-up banner (2000 x 850 mm) which can be setup at the back of the church or other place where people coming in and out can see it.
- An outdoor fence banner (2000 x 900 mm)

Parishes will be supplied with one of each of the above for each of their church buildings. Please contact the Pastoral Planning Office if you require additional promotional resources.

12 CASUAL CONVERSATIONS

13.1 PLANNING THE GATHERING

13.1.1 WHERE SHOULD I HOLD THE GATHERING?

- When selecting a venue, try to make sure that it is easily accessible for everybody, and will fit everybody in comfortably. Don't forget to check with the person responsible for the venue that it is free for you to use on the night of your gathering!
- The venue needs to be big enough for participants to break into groups for small group discussions
- A venue with a blank wall or other space where participants can place post-it notes would be helpful

13.1.2 WHEN SHOULD I HOLD THE GATHERING?

- Ideally, your parish gathering should be held before the end of October in order for the points raised here to be further discussed at the deanery level.
- The gathering needs to be held at a convenient time when as many people as possible can attend, e.g. holding sessions in the middle of the day would preclude many who would be at work.

13.1.3 WHO SHOULD I INVITE TO THE GATHERING?

- All the members of your local community should be invited
- Plenary 2020 is not only for the 10% of Catholics who gather at Mass regularly, and it is hoped that the net be cast as wide as possible. This means reaching out to Catholics who live with the parish boundaries even if they are not regular Mass-goers
- People who have had a connection with the parish e.g. married there, parents of children who received the Sacraments
- Family and friends of parishioners
- Those who work within the boundaries of the parish

13.1.4 PREPARING PARTICIPANTS FOR THE GATHERING

- The purpose of the Listening phase of Plenary 2020 is to give voice to those who are not usually heard, and listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit speaking through them
- The process described in the Plenary 2020 Small Group Booklet can be adapted to form the agenda of this gathering. However, as the process described here involves meeting several times over a number of weeks, it might be good to ask participants to reflect on the plenary questions and topics prior to the gathering

13.1.5 WAYS TO ENGAGE THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

13 ORGANISING A PARISH GATHERING

13.2 THE GATHERING

13.2.1 PARTICIPANTS

- Name tags
- Collect contact details (make sure you have privacy statement) of those who are willing to give you these

13.2.2 FOOD

You may like to consider asking people to bring along a plate, or else organise catering of light refreshments in some other way (i.e. tea, coffee, cake or sandwiches – maybe even pizza). People in your Parish might be happy to supply food – you can ask them personally or by advertising in the Parish Bulletin.

13.2.3 WHAT HAPPENS AT THE GATHERING?

- Welcome everyone
- Icebreaker activity
- Explain the purpose of the gathering which is a Listening and Dialogue Encounter
The Church genuinely wants to listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit speaking through the people. The listening goes both ways. The sessions are not meant to be a Catholic Church bashing session, but provides the opportunity for participants to share their stories as well as to start/continue a genuine process of healing for those who have been hurt and the Church as structure to address these issues.
- Explain the Plenary 2020 process, and how the gathering is only in the 1st part of the process. Assure participants that it is not a talk-fest but the group is not going to be able to change the structures and Church Law overnight.
- Explain the Diocesan process which will start happening before the conclusion of the 3-year Plenary Council process
- Lay the ground rules for the sharing session e.g.
 - » Be courteous
 - » Don't interrupt other people when they are speaking
 - » Time limit
- Brainstorm to identify topics for discussion
- Break into groups of 4–6 to discuss the three questions from Plenary 2020
 - » What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?
 - » What questions do you have about the future of the Church for the Plenary Council to consider in 2020?
 - » Do you have a story of your experience of faith, or of the Church you would like to share?
- Regroup with a representative from each small group to give a summary of the discussions
- Repeat this small group discussions until all the topics have been covered
- Ensure that good notes are taken of the evening

13 ORGANISING A PARISH GATHERING

13.2.4 PHOTOS

- Make sure you take plenty of photos (Make an announcement to make sure everyone is okay with their photo being taken)

13.2.5 ISSUES TO CONSIDER AT THE GATHERING

- It is important to have an experienced facilitator as there may be some attenders who are particularly vocal or emotional about specific topics.
- It is important to have someone with the ability to take good notes as the information will be used in other steps on the Plenary 2020 journey
- It is also important to have security as there may even be participants whose choose to attend purely to voice their anger with the Church., especially if the sessions are open to the public.


