STUDENT SRE CATECHISTS

Student SRE Catechists are required to be trained and to teach according to the approved curriculum. As a student SRE Catechist you are joining a worldwide network of faithfilled people, committed to bringing children the greatest gift of all - Jesus.

As a student SRE Catechist you may be asked to:

- lead the opening and/or closing class prayer
- take the roll
- prepare the Prayer Space
- assist with resources
- assist with role play/drama activities
- hand out activity books
- read the scripture passage
- assist with craft activities
- assist individual students as required especially students who work more slowly or need more support
- assist with technology/music
- demonstrate actions for a song
- nominate students for stickers and merit awards to the SRE Catechist
- prepare and present a lesson with assistance from your REC and SRE Catechist.

Examples of ways you can show initiative:

- if you see some students talking when they should be listening, get their attention by giving them a quiet gesture (finger to lips)
- direct a student/s back in their seat if they wander about the classroom

Remember:

- Wear your authorisation card/lanyard
- On arrival to the school, sign in at the school office and out when leaving
- If you are unsure about anything, please ask there is a lot to learn.
- Use of praise and encouragement for the right behaviours is important. We never use food as a reward.

Most of all get involved in the best way you can so it will be a positive experience for you. *Enjoy the Experience!*



Diocese of Parramatta Code of Conduct - A summary



The opportunity to work with children in the Ministry of Special Religious Education (SRE) is a wonderful privilege. As you will be representing your school and Parish community there are certain behavioural expectations of SRE Catechists and commitments to care for children and yourself. As we work in NSW public schools the NSW Department of Education Code of conduct is also applicable to us.

PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

We:

- comply with policies and lawful instructions of the diocese, and parish priest.
- are punctual, diligent and sensitive to young people's needs
- take steps to protect young people from injury or harm
- respect the privacy and confidential information of young people and other adults
- adopt appropriate standards of dress and language

PROFESSIONAL RELATIONSHIPS

We:

- are caring, respectful, and compassionate
- avoid being alone with a young person and remain removed from personal relationships
- respect cultural diversity
- treat all equally and are equally available to all
- we avoid offering or receiving gifts from individuals
- ensure physical contact is appropriate for a young person's management or care e.g. comforting an upset child; assessing an ill or injured child
- use physical intervention only as a last resort and only to ensure the safety and protection of children or others

We do not:

- use any form or corporal punishment including the use of an object e.g. a book
- use intimidation, humiliation, alienation, fear-based practices or swearing
- hold or restrain other than to prevent injury or harm
- make available, or be under the influence of, any illicit drugs or alcohol or cigarettes
- engage in any conduct of a sexual nature including touching, suggestive remarks or innuendo
- expose young people to violent material or adult concepts

We are always sensitive to young people's age and level of maturity.

> Should there be evidence of inappropriate practices in relation to young people your involvement with the SRE Ministry may be terminated.

REPORTABLE CONDUCT

It's possible that in your work as a Student SRE Catechist/Helper you develop concerns that an adult working with children has engaged in 'reportable conduct'. Reportable conduct is a sexual offence, sexual misconduct, ill treatment, neglect, assault, emotional or psychological harm OR failure to report a child at risk of harm.

Child safety is everyone's responsibility so please ensure you let someone appropriate know of your concerns - your REC or Supervising teacher or the School Principal. Reportable conduct reports can also be made to Head of CCD (ph: 8838 3486) OR to Safeguarding at People & Culture (ph:8838 3419 or safeguarding@parracatholic.org).




Risk Of Significant Harm (ROSH)

REPORT #3 - DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITIES AND JUSTICE (DCJ)

The Head of the CCD in the Diocese of Parramatta will inform the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) and Office for Safeguarding in the Diocese.

- ⇒ Confidentiality of the parties must be maintained - only discuss the matter with those who you are obliged to report to.

PRACTICAL TEACHING TECHNIQUES

CREATE A POSITIVE CLASSROOM ENVIRONMENT

- · Get to know the students by name and use their name when speaking to them.
- When students are working on an activity move about the room and praise or encourage them to continue the good work they have started.
- · Catch them 'doing good' and praise them for it, so that students see that you will give them the attention they want when they behave well.
- Always speak courteously and with respect to students. When speaking to them keep in mind "We are all made in the image and likeness of God" (Gen 1:26-27).
- Move! Children need to move. Look for ways to incorporate movement in your classes as part of the story telling, the prayer or in the form of brain breaks to help with concentration.

USE A VARIETY OF METHODS

- · Children learn in different ways so try and engage them all: visual, auditory, kinesthetic.
- · Vary your storytelling methods rather than reading the story each week use:
 - · drama
 - echo mime where the story is told using actions and the children repeat the story and actions after you;
 - · Biblical characters
 - · puppets just to name a few ways.
- There are many different prayer forms that can be used in your lessons e.g. traditional prayers, prayers of gratitude, petitions, guided meditations, prayers with actions, sung prayers, blessing prayers, written prayers etc.
- Remember to include prayer in your lesson whether it is at the beginning, the middle or the end of the lesson remember to encourage the children to participate in a reflective, prayerful manner.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

- · Be enthusiastic about the students' questions. Be glad they asked.
- Commend them for using the good minds that God gave them and encourage them to keep asking questions. Remember their questions give us valuable insight into their thinking and understanding.
- Treat all questions seriously.
- · Give simple, child appropriate answers.
- · Ask students 'What do they think?'
- · Give the students more information if they are unsatisfied with the answer.
- · Ask the student to restate the question if you think you have misunderstood what is being asked.
- · If you don't know the answer tell them that you will try to find out and invite

- them to look into it too. It is far better to say that you don't know than to make something up.
- · Always give time for the students to answer a question rather than answer your own question. The students will learn to wait for you to provide the answers.
- Some questions may be important but not appropriate to discuss in SRE. In this case refer them to a more appropriate source e.g. a parent

WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN.....

- 1. A student suggests an answer that is incorrect:
 - · Affirm that it was good for the student to offer an answer. Refer back to the lesson to point the student in the right direction. Clarify any misunderstandings
- 2. No-one offers an answer:
 - · Give the class some extra information or retell the section of the lesson that contains the answer. If required tell them the answer and move on
- 3. A student's answer is very lengthy:
 - Affirm that the answer is thoughtful but that others in the class might like a chance to answer. Suggest to the student that you talk to them later (don't forget to do so)
- 4. A student begins to give you personal details or information that is not appropriate:
 - · Follow the Notification Process for Student SRE Catechists.

ON ARRIVAL AT SCHOOL

- · Arrive at the school at least ten minutes before the lesson if possible.
- Go to the office and sign in using either the school SRE attendance book or the electronic sign in process (depending which system your school uses)
- · Be punctual to the classroom as the children should not be left alone.

YOUR FIRST SPECIAL RELIGIOUS EDUCATION LESSON

- 1. Introduce yourself to the children.
- 2. Discuss some rules for the class with the children.
- 3. Use positive language, e.g. 'Listen when others are speaking' rather than 'Don't talk while others are speaking.'
- 4. Teach the behaviour you want. If the children do something you aren't happy with tell them and teach them what you expect. Always practice this with the students.
- 5. Give instructions clearly and slowly and only one at a time.
- 6. Don't allow the children to railroad the lesson. They will want to tell you their life stories. Keep them on task.

CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT

In SRE we strive for a respectful and cooperative classroom. A few important things to help with Classroom Management:

PREPARATION Preparing your lessons will help with the management of your class.

- Be organised
- · Try not to cover too much in each lesson
- · Keep it simple
- · Keep it do-able
- Have some useful activities that can be used in spare five minute periods or for children who work quickly and finish before others.

CLEAR RULES AND EXPECTATIONS

- · Expect good behaviour and acknowledge it when it happens
- Don't talk/preach at the students allow time for questions and discussion
- · Above all radiate enthusiasm, joy and calm
- · Follow school policies including the discipline policy and evacuation policy, lock-down procedures etc.

CONSISTENT AND PERSISTENT REINFORCEMENT

- · Calmly insist that reasonable standards are met. Calmly persist until they are
- · Make use of the school's reward program e.g. merit cards, points system etc.
- · Be consistent and fair in discipline and follow-through with consequences
- · Speak quietly and privately to individual students. Never engage in a disciplinary conversation across the room.

GET HELP WHEN NEEDED:

 Ask for advice and support, when needed, from your school appointed supervising teacher, SRE Catechist, or Classroom teacher.

THE ABC OF SRE

Always be early for your class.

Be careful never to be alone with only one or two students.

Class rules/expectations should be set early in the year, preferably in reference to the school rules/expectations.

Do find out about school policies covering rolls, behaviour management, mobile phone policy, lock down and emergency procedures etc.

Ensure additional resource materials are in line with the approved curriculum.

Form good working relationships with staff at the school and SEE/SRE teachers from other denominations/faiths.

Go with confidence into your class knowing God is always with you.

Helpers in the classroom are God's gift to teachers, and a good way to start in the ministry.

In all lessons adhere to the approved curriculum - Christ Our Light and Life .

Jellybeans, other lollies or food can never be given to students due to the risk of an allergic reaction.

Know your students' world. Take an interest by noticing important school events

Learn your student's and class teacher's names

Make sure you are aware of and follow your school procedure if you are unable to teach/assist your lesson.

Never take photos of the students in your class.

Organise approval for visual resources e.g. DVDs, YouTube clips in advance with the school SRE Co-ordinator.

Pray and Prepare your lessons well - the work put into preparation will be rewarded in the classroom.

Questions should be encouraged to foster high student involvement and self esteem.

Remember to wear your Authorisation Card and lanyard while on school grounds.

Self reflection allows us to review lesson effectiveness and identity new ideas for future lessons.

Teaching is about relationships. We can't communicate the Gospel message without supportive relationships. Be mindful to teach with sensitivity and age appropriateness.

Understand different learning preferences and capabilities. Be mindful of students with additional needs.

Visual resources that are bright, interesting and age appropriate are a powerful way to enhance student learning.

When you are dealing with disruptive behaviour use positive reinforcement techniques and ask for assistance.

Xplain clearly the behaviour you expect from your students and always give clear instructions.

You always need to remember - parents are the first and principal educators of their children in their faith.

Zeal and zest inspired by the Spirit will carry the message of God's love to the students.
